Meeting adjourned approximately 02:00


In The News Hara Arena roof blown off after tornadoes

The Hamfest was an outstanding financial success, as well. We had 160 attendees through the front door, included many from other provinces and the US. The Fargo, ND Club was well represented on Sunday. We had 34 vendor tables accounted for. The WARC Cable Shop was in full swing. The prize draw and raffle were very popular. Some preliminary numbers, with some bills and receipts still to be turned in, are as follows:

Will I never learn? RAC came and two local suppliers were there. The remote stations were fun and interesting.



Mobile Use of Amateur Radio ???

Below is a screen shot of an e-mail from Gord Spado, Inspector, Winnipeg Police Service Traffic Division outlining the Section and Exemptions in the Highway Traffic Act concerning Amateur Radio and CB radio.

In particular section 215.1(5) (a) (i -ii) is the important area that concerns our exemption.

FW: Distract driving and CB radios?

Good morning,

There are a couple of pieces in legislation that explain the exceptions regarding radio usage. The violation for Hand Operation Electronic Devices (ie the changed penalties) related to section 215.1(2) of the HTA.

Under the Highway Traffic Act:

Exception — certain radios and other equipment

215.1(5) Subsection (2) does not apply to the use of

- (a) a radio apparatus, as defined in section 2 of the Radiocommunication Act (Canada), that
 - (i) is operated under the authority of a radio operator certificate issued under that Act,
 - (ii) must, in order for its operator to communicate with another person, transmit radio signals to another radio apparatus that is operated under the authority of a radio licence issued under that Act, other than a radio licence issued to a cellular telephone network provider, or
 - (iii) is the type of radio apparatus commonly known as citizen's band radio or family band radio; or

For further clarity, the Regulations related to these devices also adds the following:

Exempt devices

3 Subsection 215.1(2) of the Act does not apply to (a) the use of a two-way radio or trunked mobile radio system;

A QRP Field Day By Gerry VE4GKS

As most of you are probably aware, June 22/23 weekend is the annual ARRL Field Day. This year WARC has arranged for two FD sites and operations. The first, for "regular" operation, is St. Vital Park. The second, for QRP operation, is Camp Amisk. As the executive knows I have QRP equipment, I was "volunteered" (military speak for ordered) to run this portion of FD. The planned operation will be as follows:

I have four QRP transceivers:

- 1) A Xiegu X108G Outdoor. This is a more-or-less conventional superhet transceiver.
- 2) A Xiegu X1M Platinum Pro. This, like the X108G, is more-or-less conventional. It is not as good as the X108G
- 3) A LNR Engineering LD-11. This is a software defined radio.
- 4) A YouKits HB1B Mark 3. This is more of a transmitter and receiver in one package.

I also have a couple of antenna matching units, a few keys and paddles, and two Hamcrafters CW terminals (a K42 and a K44). These last combine a keyer, a keyboard keyer, a memory keyer, and a code reader, in one unit. They are not quite identical in operation. I also have an assortment of wire lengths for random wires, plus a QRP dipole with integral transmission line.

The two Xiegus and the LD-11 are capable of operation on the 10 through 80 meter bands, CW or SSB. The HB1B is CW only on 15, 20, & 40 meters. The X108G and the LD-11 can also operate on 160, and the LD-11 on 6, although I do not anticipate using these two bands. (The X1M "can" operate on all bands below 30 Mhz., including those below the AM radio band, but needs external band pass filters, which I do not have.) All four transceivers have built-in keyers, although I anticipate we will use the external keyers. The HB1B does not have a speaker – you must use a headset.

I do have a 100 watt solar panel, which I hope will provide enough power for the radios for the weekend (if the sun co-operates). I do have a couple of smaller batteries, but need a charge controller, & would like a larger battery. I hope to have these by FD.

Tentative plans are that we will operate two stations, using the X108G and the LD-11. We will use my call, operating as VE4GKS/P. The St. Vital Park operation will use the club call (VE4BB). The X1M & the HB1B will be spare transceivers, in the event one or both of the "main" transceivers gives problems.

Getting antennas up should be no problem. The site has a 30' mast with a halyard, and there are lots of trees to hang wires on. I have two each of 100' reflective paracords, 100' mason's line, and 50' mason's line, plus a good spool of 100 pound test hard

braided dacron cord.

Digital operation: the Xiegus and the LD-11 are CAT-capable. Only the LD-11 has a built-in sound card, however, so this will be the only one possibly used for digital modes. I will bring out one, or possibly both, of my Lenovo laptops (aT410 & a W540, both with maximum memory & SSDs instead of hard drives). If we do use digital modes, the software will be FLDIGI.

General notes on Camp Amisk:

In previous years, all operation has been from Amisk, and the club has arranged for meals for the week-end, and somebody has volunteered to be the chef in charge. At the moment, I don't know what will be done here, with two sites in operation.

The site is reached as follows: From the south perimeter highway, go south on Waverly Street for several kilometers. (Note that if you are on Waverly south of the perimeter, you will not be able to go north from the perimeter.) You will come to a small valley. The La Salle River is in the bottom of the valley. Continue across the bridge, and climb out of the valley on the south side. Just before you reach the top of the valley, there is a driveway to your left. Take this driveway, watch for the entrance archway to the camp, and continue to the site on your right.

Note that there is no water or plumbing on the site. You will have to bring drinking water. There are a couple of outhouses, and there has been in previous years waterless hand disinfectant. It might be an idea to bring some, and a couple of rolls of paper, in case there isn't any. A supply of skeeter repellent might also be an idea, although these pests haven't been an issue in the past.

There is lots of space for RVs, pitching tents, etc. There is a shelter with a roof, which we will be able to use. Perhaps some of those who are campers would like to help out.

All we really need now is for some operators to get into the real spirit of FD. Any volunteers?
