Any contacts or moments that stick out in memory? "I didn't have HF at home. My first contact was at RRC, where we had all the equipment. It was pretty exciting for a 23 year old to contact Norway, Russia, and Japan. Later, I talked with Spokane, Washington, on 2m by skip while driving."

What have you gotten from amateur radio? "Over the years I've enjoyed making new contacts and new friends. My wife, Cathy VE4ZOE, got her licence after me. We took a radio to Hawaii, and in our travels across Canada. I've enjoyed talking with visitors to Winnipeg, and folks passing through."

Any particular interest in Amateur Radio? "Now that I'm retired, I'm looking forward to setting up an HF station."

Public Service? "Not specifically in Amateur Radio. I worked with the 911 Communication Centre and as an EMT for the Winnipeg Fire Department. Now I'm the Liaison Officer for the United Way with the Coats for Kids Program. (You can make a donation through any fire hall.)

Advice for new hams? We need to get the new hams involved right after they graduate. Rather than wait for them to get on the air by themselves, we might have to call them. I don't like early check-ins on the nets, especially just before the net begins. It results in fewer operators on the net, so it just becomes a list with no activity."

Future of Amateur Radio? "I think we are heading in the right direction by targeting young folks. How do we get them interested in our hobby? Perhaps we need to have more open houses; displays at events such as Folklorama; and at the malls."

In response to the current Covid-19 crisis, Radio Amateurs of Canada is pleased to announce that it is introducing two new online Amateur Radio courses so that individuals can upgrade their qualifications while continuing to practise social/physical distancing.

RAC Online Basic Amateur Radio Qualification Course:

The course offers an introduction into the wonderful world of Amateur Radio and prepares students for their Basic Qualification Examination. It will be conducted with the assistance of the Annapolis Valley Amateur Radio Club (AVARC) of Nova Scotia.

RAC Maple Leaf Operator Online Advanced Qualification Course:

The course is an excellent opportunity to upgrade your qualifications so that you will be able to run higher power and to operate your own repeater sites. The course is being offered at no charge to RAC Maple Leaf Operator Members – both current and future – who already have their Basic Amateur Radio Qualification.

Additional information:

RAC Online Basic Amateur Radio Qualification Course

This course prepares students for the Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED) Basic Qualification Level Operator Certificate exam to operate on allocated Amateur Radio frequencies.

The course will use the GoToMeeting web-based service and will start on Thursday, April 16 and will finish in mid-June. Classes will be held on Thursday evenings from 6 pm to 8:30 (1800 – 2030) Eastern Time (1900 – 2130 Atlantic Time) and Sunday afternoons 1 pm to 3:30 pm (1300 – 1530) Eastern Time (1400 – 1630 Atlantic Time).

The course instructor is Al Penney, VO1NO. Al was first licensed in 1977 and has been active in many areas of Amateur Radio including contesting, DXing, VHF/UHF weak signal, satellites, emergency communications and DXpeditioning. He has served as the President of six different Amateur Radio clubs in both Canada and the United States and currently chairs the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) Region 2 Band Planning Committee. Al has taught the Basic Qualification Amateur Radio Course since 1994.

Cost: The registration fee for the course is \$50 plus GST/HST. The cost of the Basic Study Guide is extra and an order link will be provided upon completion of payment.

The new RAC Online Advanced Qualification Course is an excellent opportunity to upgrade your qualifications so that you will be able to run higher power and to operate your own repeater sites.

The course will be offered at no charge to RAC Maple Leaf Operator Members – both current and future – who already have their Basic Amateur Radio Qualification including:

- Current RAC Maple Leaf Operator Members who have Basic certification

Confessions of a Casual Contester - 2 From the shack of David VE4DL

I am not now, nor ever have been, a Contester. I don't see myself becoming a Contester either, if one defines the term to include round-the-clock operations, intravenous fluids and diapers, and frequent relays of cold, one-hand meals. Not my thing, at all. BUT......

I am a friend of Cary VE4EA, and I've attended his training sessions for CW ops a few times. He's a sly one, that Cary; makes things easy and fun, not intimidating or scary. Gotta watch that. Anyway, I've also gone to his place for a couple of major CW contests, and while he listened and translated, I sent the replies. First time or two with a paddle, too slow, and last time with keyboard code. That was interesting. I also found I was picking up callsigns and exchanges at something over 30wpm. That blew my mind – I consider myself a QRS operator, even after several years of casual work with the Straight Key Century Club. On a really good day I can run 20wpm but mostly I hear at 12-15.

So I thought about this a while, and decided to give this a try on my own. I had acquired a Vibrocube paddle for the Kenwood, and then I found a WinKeyer on a swap shop and collected that. It's very easy to set these up with the 590S, two wires only required. I programmed the black box with 3 buttons to match the exchange for ARRL DX CW contest, and waited.

So, here's the thing — I know what the other station should be sending: 'CQ DX callsign' or a variation, or 'QRZ', typically. Followed by '599 and a number' (their power out in watts). All I had to send was '599 MB'. Easy peasy, no? So one button is my 'callsign', another is '599 5NN MB' and the third is 'agn? 'All I need to go.

I also installed N1MM+ on my laptop and with a couple of keystrokes had it set up for and talking to my Kenwood. This is great contest logging software that does a shyte-ton more than I need it to or can understand, but with Cary's tutoring I knew the minimum I needed.

Comes the day and I fire up on 20m and there's plenty of signals out there. I can hear CQ at probably 50wpm, but looked for ones where the callsign was copyable. Here's the trick: you don't need to copy it all at once, you can listen to the call repeatedly, adding characters as you understand them until you've got it all typed in. Then listen to several exchanges. The CQ station is al-

ways sending the same info – listen until you have it all. Then start pushing your callsign button. I had mine set to send at 30, way above what my hand can manage. The delight is, I can play with these 30-40wpm stations using this method. I don't have to be a code warrior! Listen for your own callsign to come back. Push button 2. Listen for the caller to move on to another callsign, and hit 'Log It'. Done, you've logged your first DX CW contact! Run and tell your XYL! Pour a celebratory bevvy. Get back to the shack, there are plenty more to find. Operating casually with long breaks to actually earn a living, I still worked 98 stations on 3 bands, all at well above my usual comprehension speed. That's fun, peeps. But it isn't contesting. Nope. Not at all.

Tall Towers Submitted by Derek VE4HAY

You may have seen these two towers on your drive to the Fargo Hamfest. They are 5 miles apart between Fargo & Grand Forks. They are the 4th & 5th tallest man made objects in the world. Only an Amateur Radio operator would care about this fact.

The KVLY-TV mast (formerly the KTHI-TV mast) is a 2,063-foot-tall (629 m) television-transmitting mast in



Traill County, North Dakota, United States. used by Fargo station KVLY-TV channel 11. Completed during 1963, it was the tallest structure in the world until succeeded by the Warsaw radio mast during 1974, which collapsed in 1991, again making the KVLY-TV mast the tallest structure in the world until the Buri Khalifa exceeded it in 2008. It remains the fourth-tallest

Blanchard,

structure in the world (since the construction of the Tokyo Skytree and the Shanghai Tower), the tallest structure in the Western Hemisphere, and the tallest broadcasting mast in the world.

The mast is located 3 miles (4.8 km) west of Blanchard, North Dakota, halfway between Fargo and Grand Forks. It became the tallest artificial structure, and the first man-made structure to exceed 2,000 feet (610 m) in height, upon the completion of its construction on August 13, 1963.

Owned by Gray Television of Atlanta, Georgia, the tower broadcasts at 356 kW on channel 44 for television station KVLY-TV (channel 11 PSIP, an NBC/CBS affiliate) which is based in Fargo. The tower provides a broadcast area of roughly 9,700 square miles (25,000 km2), which is a radius of about 55.6 miles (89.5 km).

When the mast was built the call letters of the television station for which it was built were changed to KTHI, the "HI" referring to the height of the mast. The top is reachable by a two-person service elevator (built by Park Manufacturing of Charlotte, North Carolina) or ladder.

The KRDK-TV mast is a television transmitting tower in Traill County, North Dakota, United States. At 2060

ft (628 m), it is the fifth-tallest structure in the world, shorter by 3 ft (1 m) than the KVLY-TV mast, which stands 5 miles northeast.

Located 3.5 miles (6 km) northeast of Galesburg, North Dakota, it was completed in 1966, to replace the station's previous mast, a 1,085-foot (331 m) tower 15 miles (25 km) northeast of Valley City, North Dakota (or southwest of Pillsbury) which was sold to KOVC, an AM radio station.

The antenna transmits at 100 kW for KRDK-TV (formerly KXJB-TV) of Valley City/ Fargo; the station and tower are owned by Major Market Broadcasting.

The mast has fallen and been rebuilt twice. The first collapse occurred at 9:08 A.M. February 14, 1968 when the rotor of a Marine helicopter severed some guy-wires; all four aboard the helicopter were killed in the mishap.[1] The television station was off the air for eight days, finally resuming broadcasts from their previous (KOVC) tower. A replacement mast of the same height as the one destroyed was completed in four and a half months.

Tall Towers continued.....

The second mast fell during an ice storm which hit the area on April 6, 1997, subjecting it to wind gusts of 70 mph and causing at least four inches (100 mm) of ice to accumulate on the structure, resulting in the structure's failure at 6:09 P.M.. Cable programming was resumed by 8:34 and broadcasts by 3 P.M. the following afternoon through coordination with other affiliates; a 735-foot (224 m) temporary tower was completed and resumed broadcasts by July 10. This tower, known as KXJB-TV Mast 2, still stands next to the full-height mast.

Work began on replacement of the full-height mast with a more durably-built structure on April 1, 1998, and had reached the tower's previous height by July 30. That day members of the construction crew affixed a four-foot (1.2 m) flagpole to the top of the tower, making the structure's height effectively 2064 ft (629 m), or one foot higher than the KVLY mast (the flagpole was later removed). Broadcasting for Channel 4 was switched to the new mast on August 15.
