Grade 6 Gets Intro to Ham Radio By David VE4DAR

The Grade 6 class at J.B. Mitchell School received an introduction to Amateur Radio from David VE4DAR on May 19. Among the 27 students who participated, several had emigrated from other countries.



Each student received a handout which included an overview of Amateur Radio, the phonetic alphabet, Canada's call sign prefixes, and a diagram of the Electromagnetic Spectrum. My PowerPoint covered some rules and regulations, testing, respect, public service and emergencies.

SHARP-6 Launched from Carman Collegiate

Five high altitude balloons (HABs) were launched from Carman Manitoba on Friday, April 30th. Shaftesbury, Fort Richmond, Garden City, Maples and St. James Collegiate students arrived in Carman before 9 AM. Students went through their pre-launch check lists as they prepared their scientific payloads for flight. Tracking radios, cameras, temperature sensors, Geiger counters and other circuits had to be turned on and checked in sequence. The large weather balloons were inflated and hoisted on lines to the sound of Gustav Holst's, The Planets (nice touch Garden City). All teams were ready to launch before 11:30. After a countdown and siren blast, the HABs took flight.

The weather was perfect. No clouds and very light winds aloft meant that conditions were perfect for photography and the chase would be a short. Students and staff packed up the launch site, and refueled on hamburgers, fries and milk-shakes at Syl's Drive Inn, all the while monitoring the flights using their APRS (automatic packet reporting system) radios and smart phones. Then sometime after 1 PM as the balloons were approaching apogee, the chase began.

Our goal was to arrive in the landing zone before the payloads descended to earth on their parachutes and get photos of the landings. This we did thanks to our amateur radio tracking gear. Many of the chase cars included student and staff amateur radio operators with VHF radios. Before the balloons reached their burst altitudes and the payloads began to descend from the stratosphere, radio operators transmitted up to the minute altitude and position reports.

The SHARP balloon was observed by the team 30 km above us and one team member; Jordan Bowley (VE4JRB), actually saw the balloon burst over 100,000 feet above. At this altitude

the bright white balloon is over 8 metres across. Unfortunately, the burst was 2 kilometres lower than predicted, so SHARP's GPS/Arduino payload release circuit was not activated. The highest altitude reached by any team was 32.2 km or 105,600 feet by Gopher-Space (the Garden City Collegiate team).

The SHARP team was in position to see the payload land 1/4 mile away. Observing a parachute land-

ing was another first for SHARP. Clearly we are getting better at tracking our HABs, coordinating the chase and getting to the landing zone ahead of time. The Fort Richmond team also saw their payload land. All five school's recovered their payloads quickly.

Amateur radio communications between cars and at the Carman launch site was ably controlled by Shaftesbury's Dylan Fijal (VA4DFJ). On the way back to Winnipeg, students Tara Towns (VE4TET) and Jordan Bowley (VE4JRB) made contacts with an amateur radio operator in Croatia. They were travelling with SHARP's good friend, Peter Toth (VE4TTH) who allowed them the use of his HF radio. A great day was had by all.

We would like to thank principal Jack Phillips and the staff and students at Carman Collegiate for hosting the launch. We would also like to thank the amateur radio I-gate operators in Manitoba and North Dakota that moved our APRS packets to the internet. Thanks also to the understanding administrators at Shaftesbury, Fort Richmond, Maples, St. James and Garden City Collegiate who released staff and students for the day thus supporting the engineering and scientific endeavors of the students. We fully expect other high schools will join us for another high altitude adventure next year including Immanuel Christian, Steinbach and Carman collegiates.

The wrap up to this year's flights will be next fall when Shaftesbury will host the first Manitoba high school HAB symposium. This event will hopefully produce better payloads and improved flight operations as we learn from the previous year's successes and failures. Canada 150: Special Event Prefixes for Canada's Sesquicentennial

At the Dayton Hamvention, Radio Amateurs of Canada announced that it has secured permission for all Canadian Radio Amateurs to use special call sign prefixes to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Canada's Confederation.

National, regional and local events will take place throughout 2017 to celebrate the anniversary and Canadian Amateurs will let their counterparts around the world know of our celebration by using the following special prefixes:

- Amateurs and clubs whose regular call signs start with VA will be able to use the CF prefix instead of VA (for example, VA3RAC will be authorized to use the CF3RAC call sign).
- Amateurs and clubs whose regular call signs start with VE will be able to use the CG prefix instead of VE (e.g., VE4RAC will be authorized to use CG4RAC).
- Amateurs and clubs whose regular call signs start with VO will be able to use the CH prefix instead of VO (e.g., VO1RAC will be authorized to use CH1RAC).
- Amateurs and clubs whose regular call signs start with VY will be able to use the CI prefix instead of VY (e.g., VY2RAC will be authorized to use CI2RAC).

These special prefixes are optional and Amateurs can choose if and when to use the special prefix vs their normal prefix at any time during the year. Stay tuned to the RAC website (http://wp.rac.ca) for additional information.
